PLANNING OUR FUTURE COMMUNITY NEEDS ASSESSMENT

We've been talking for a number of months about the Community Needs Assessment, which is a project undertaken by The Lending Cupboard to learn, from the community and through research, about the current status and future projections of Central Alberta's economy, demography and health. The Executive Summary will be available for download on the website following November 8th.

This project began in May of 2016. Nearly 50 people were consulted, through a series of interviews, focus groups, and community consultations. The final report was adopted by the Board of Directors of The Lending Cupboard on October 6th. Now we're ready to share the important findings with you!

Why Conduct a Community Needs Assessment?

When The Lending Cupboard's Board of Directors and staff team met in the fall of 2015 to undertake their strategic planning for the next 3 years, the pressures of growth facing the organization were top of mind. Although the organization maintains a full show floor, has been making use of a sea-can in the parking lot, and also has an overflow warehouse, roughly 80% of its equipment is out on loan at any given

time. The organization is well aware that a decision about its space is needed; but how to grow? Where to grow? Move or stay? In order to make responsible, informed decisions about its facility needs, the organization decided it needed to learn from the community about current and future demand for its services.

The information in the Community Needs Assessment Report will provide a "snap shot" of elements of Central Alberta life, as well as a glimpse into what the next few years may hold for our region, as related to the potential impact for the services provided by The Lending Cupboard. However, there is information in this document that will be of interest and relevance to municipal governments, not-for-profit (social profit) organizations, community groups and businesses.

Lending Cupboard Growth

In its first year of operation, the Cupboard lent out 330 pieces of equipment and had a total client interaction of 456. In its 2015-16 fiscal year, 16,000 pieces of equipment were lent out to 4,300 clients, with a total of 8,800 clients in and out of the Lending Cupboard doors – a staggering 800% increase. This exponential growth, all while operating out of the same facility, reveals the importance of the Cupboard number of Cupboard clients are referred from clinics, home care and hospitals as well as being self-referred, for any number of reasons, from all around the region. The Cupboard has seen clients come from as far away as Lethbridge.



What we Learned

Here are some of the 'highlights' of the discoveries made during the project:

- There are 487,000 seniors in our province, and the baby boomer generation, consisting of those born between 1946-1964, is the largest population group.
- The share of seniors' population is expected to grow, from the 2009 level of 10.4% to an anticipated 25.7% of the total population by 2050.
- The proportion of "older seniors" is also expected to rise sharply, with 1 in 13 Albertans being over the age of 80 by the year 2050.
- By 2036, roughly 20% of Alberta's population will be over the age of 65.
- Seniors who live alone are more commonplace in rural areas of Central Alberta, where support services may not be as readily available. Challenges they face may include lack of access to health services, lack of transportation, lack of social or family support, isolation and financial constraints.

- Increased unemployment has led to a reduction in the use of private, fee-for-service physiotherapy and other para-health services. This has increased wait times for physio, and means that people in this service stream will likely be relying on mobility and daily living aids for longer periods of time.
- The recession in Alberta is leading to increased poverty and financial strain. Central Albertans will have less disposable income and less capacity to pay for health supports such as medical equipment purchases or rentals. This will put increased pressure on The Lending Cupboard, as people look for more affordable options to meet their health needs.
- Government funding opportunities, particularly in health-related initiatives, may be less available over the next few years.
 Additionally, with the current economic struggles, corporate sponsorship and donations to community agencies may be strained. The Lending Cupboard relies largely on community donations, grants and sponsorships.

Conclusion

This project was an eye-opener. There are many issues facing Central Alberta; most often, these issues are dealt with in 'silos', organizations, governments and health departments all working to make progress on a specific issue. When one puts it all together, however, Central Alberta and Alberta in general have growing pressures on several fronts. While the issues discussed in the Community Needs Assessment give The Lending Cupboard valuable information for planning and strategy purposes, it also highlights the need for community support to grow along with The Cupboard.

The full Community Needs Assessment Report has broad implications for almost every facet of community life, and is worth having on hand as a reference tool.
