"Let's shine bright - like diamonds - and shine light in our communities."



Remembering our dear volunteer Sarah White



It's with heavy hearts that we here at TLC share the sad news of the passing of our long-time volunteer Sarah White.

Sarah passed away on May 10th after a courageous and valiant battle with cancer.

Her commitment to TLC was nothing short of amazing and inspiring - she started working with us on January 18, 2016, and she proved to be a faithful, dedicated, and compassionate member of our team.

"Her amazing kindness and love for people shone through in her every interaction," said Lori Shatto, TLC's executive director. "She will be dearly missed by all who had the absolute pleasure of working with her. Sarah will always hold a special part in the TLC story.

"For me personally, I will never forget and cherish Sarah's tremendous strength and her positive attitude in every situation."

Our systems coordinator, Kathy Cole, described Sarah as always upbeat, positive and kind.

"I don't recall ever hearing her complain about her health issues; she just handled things with grace and dignity. She also formed some close friendships with other volunteers here, and a group of them were 'dinner' buddies," said Kathy, adding that Sarah went through so much during the course of her time with us here at TLC, including her first diagnosis with cancer and her subsequent course of treatment.

"She was then given a clean bill of health. But then her husband was diagnosed with cancer and passed away. Shortly after his death, she had to put her dog down (she had gotten the dog for her husband). Then, shortly after that, her next cancer diagnosis came. Again, she handled it so well," explained Kathy.

Each struggle was faced with grace and an unmistakable sense of determination to 'press on'. "I don't think I ever saw Sarah angry. I also always enjoyed listening to her deal with clients," Kathy added. "Sarah is missed, and we all feel her loss."

Brenda Radu, TLC's volunteer coordinator, explained that Sarah's professionalism always shone through her interactions with clients with sincerity and warmth. "She was comforting to people, and she was happy. She had a great smile, too.

"We all loved Sarah - she was a woman who had incredible strength," added Brenda, referring to Sarah's battles with cancer. "And no matter what she was facing, she always showed up for her shift with a smile."

Brenda recalled how when Sarah's husband passed on; it wasn't long before she returned to her volunteer post.

"She said she needed to be with her TLC family. And she was family - like all of our volunteers. She was cool and calm and had an attitude of, 'We will get through this.' It didn't matter what was going on, how busy it was or what she was dealing with personally. I'm going to miss her - Wednesday afternoons will have a big void in them."

Sarah's good friend Charlotte, who also volunteers at TLC, noted how the two became very close over the years. "I don't know how to describe her. She was someone that you knew you could share things with. She also shared herself, and she understood you. She was a very, very good friend."
