Thanks to the generosity of our friends at **Lacombe and** Drayton Valley Ford, we have had a van that our volunteer drivers use to take medical equipment all across And what does he love most about getting the equipment Central Alberta.

It can make a world of difference for those in need of equipment who just wouldn't have access to it any other way.

Our receptionist Genene Rybicky knows firsthand how helpful our delivery service is. She noted that there are many folks who simply cannot come to our facility to pick up the equipment they so desperately need.

"It's absolutely a key service, because a lot of people don't have family to help them out. Also, a lot of our seniors don't drive. I once had a lovely couple who contacted us, and he was severely blind, so they were struggling with trying to maintain their independence in the community. They needed this equipment so that they could keep thriving in their home."

Enter the delivery service. Rybicky said that when clients discover that we offer a delivery service, they are amazed.

One of our volunteer drivers. Ron, said seeing the smiles when he makes a delivery is extremely fulfilling.

"They are appreciative at that point already, because accessing the equipment at times is tough," he explains. "Some of them say it's a lifesaver. One lady told me, 'If it wasn't for you guys, I would never get out. I wouldn't know where to go, and I don't have the money to purchase it'.

For Ron, knowing the delivery service is having that kind of amazing impact makes it that much more worthwhile -

adding to the joy of volunteering at TLC.



COMBATING THE 'WINTER BLUES'

Our chilly winter months can bring about feelings of isolation and loneliness in anyone, and seniors can be even more vulnerable during this season.

The local branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association offers plenty of programming designed specifically for seniors, explained Monica Davis, program supervisor.

But the scope of their programming goes beyond those challenges – reaching to a range of topics that can really help to make a positive difference.

"We have a 'Seniors Coping with Change' course that is a single session," Davis said. "It's all about strategies and tools to help cope with changes in your life as you age when there are some big transitions. We will also facilitate that program anywhere in the community."

Davis said other services include helping connect seniors with the help they need, including the challenges of tackling paperwork, and navigating bureaucracy to access support.

"A lot of it's about navigating those complex systems and those big applications to do things like switch your income over, etc. It's completely free - just give us a call and we will help vou."

As for the basics of managing feelings of isolation that winter can bring, Davis recommends that folks try to get outside even just once a day. She also encourages people to simply pick up the phone and ask for help – something many are reluctant to do out of fear of 'being a bother'.





"It really helps us feel better, especially at this time of year," she said. "It's a tough season for a lot of people."

She also noted that some seniors have a tougher time expressing how they are feeling when things aren't going well. "When you don't know what to call it, how do you ask for help or support?"

Depression is the most common mental health illness for older adults and has deep negative impacts on all aspects of their lives, not to mention the impact on family and community, according to the Canadian Coalition for Seniors Mental Health.

"My biggest advice is just to call - we will figure it out together," she said. "We want more people to know about all of these services because we are here to help!"

Here at TLC, we are also working to help our volunteer team deal with feelings of isolation, and part of that comes from creating community.

"One way that we are working to reduce any sense of isolation or loneliness is by launching a coffee time here at TLC for former volunteers to drop by for a visit," explained Volunteer Coordinator Brenda Radu.

Come on down and have a coffee with us and see your old friends here at TLC.

"It's about connection. A lot of them are also friends with other current volunteers, who they may not be seeing
