CLIENTS REMAIN AT THE FOREFRONT

There is no doubt that the past couple of years have brought challenges to our 'normal routines' here at The Lending Cupboard – but meeting the needs of each and every client has always remained at the forefront.

Pandemic challenges have affected virtually everyone – particularly those waiting for surgeries. There have been delays or cancellations to any number of operations and procedures – and that takes a toll on both patients and their families.

We at TLC have tried to alleviate any of the impacts of this for our clients.

For our staff, it's primarily about being flexible, as Systems Coordinator Kathy Cole pointed out. For example, many times, clients who have already borrowed equipment are informed at the last minute of surgical cancellation.

"We then ask them at that point to keep the equipment because they don't know when their surgery will be rescheduled and we didn't want them returning it one day and then get notice that their surgery date was set again," she said.

Cancellations can also lead to prolonged periods of pain and hardship, so the typical six-week loan periods (for some specialized pieces) have been extended to meet the needs of clients, she said.

"Hospital stays have been cut short and many times, people are home right after surgery – so those medical aids also have to be in place," noted Cole.

Executive Director Dawna Morey agreed the impact of cancelled surgeries has been observed from the start of the pandemic.

"In fact, the most recent months I would say we've had clients who have experienced cancellations, re-bookings, cancellations, re-bookings – and each and every time, we hear the client's anxiety about that, and their concerns about the equipment that they have already taken out.

"We also have clients who are using equipment simply because their mobility is being impacted so much while they wait for those surgeries to happen," Morey added.

"But it's important for us that we keep our mission front and centre – we are here for our clients and we will accommodate and support them where they need that support."

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MEET OUR CLIENT CASEY!

He stopped by The Lending Cupboard to pick up some equipment to help him recover from upcoming hip surgery, and he's thankful for the help and the assistance that he received from our volunteers today. "I'm going in for my second total hip replacement and this is so convenient for people who need to get this equipment," he said, adding that he picked up a Cryo-cuff. Casey, 28, is undergoing the surgery due to juvenile rheumatoid arthritis, which was diagnosed when he was a youngster. "I had the one hip replaced about six years ago. And now, within the last year or so, this other one has worn out," he explained, adding that he heard about TLC through the hip and knee clinic. "They recommended this place." It's proven to be a positive experience in the midst of a challenging time. "The service is exceptional - everyone is right there to help you right away. You don't have to wait very long."



Take care! Helpful tips on the prevention of falls

While the risk of falls do increase as people age, falls are not considered a normal part of aging. There are actions that can be taken to help older adults avoid falls and stay active and independent. Use the following key messages and supporting tips and tools to help older adults reduce their risk of falling.







Keep Active -

- Promote exercises that build strength and balance, such as resistance training, tai chi or at FindingBalanceAlberta.ca.
- Promote the use of supportive footwear.
- Help older adults to find activities they enjoy at a local seniors' center.

Check Your Vision – Encourage older adults to have a complete annual eye exam

- Encourage older adults to give their eyes time to adjust to light and to pay attention to their surroundings to help prevent falls.
- Changes to vision may increase the risk of falling. Remind older adults that Alberta Health Care covers the cost of an annual eye exam for adults aged 65 and older. Some seniors may also be eligible for limited reimbursement for prescription eyeglasses.

Review Your Medications -

- Encourage older adults to ask to learn about side effects, interactions, and proper dosing when starting a new medication by asking questions.
- Encourage older adults to have at home and in their wallet a list of their medications.
- Encourage older adults to speak with their doctor if they experience dizziness and to learn about managing blood pressure.



OVERSTOCK ITEMS FOR SALE

We at The Lending Cupboard are always very grateful for the tremendous community support we receive from residents across the Central Alberta region.

That support has led to an unusual situation – we actually have too much stock at our facility these days. To that end, we are featuring several valuable pieces of medical equipment for sale.

The purpose is two-fold – to decrease our current inventory and make way for all kinds of items that our community truly needs, but also to provide important and much-needed devices at extremely reasonable rates.





Examples of items for sale run the gamut from bath stools (\$29.50 including GST), bath transfer benches (\$84 including GST) and various walkers/rollators (\$36.75 including GST).

"First of all, we always want the community to know that loans of equipment will always continue – people will always be able to borrow equipment when they need it," explained Dawna Morey, executive director of The Lending Cupboard. "Our primary goal is to remove barriers to receiving that equipment.

"In the meantime, we have also found ourselves overstocked – as a result of excess equipment that has come back to us through either generous donations from the community or perhaps because of loved ones who have passed on.

"We also understand that there are people who need equipment over the longer term. They may need it for more than six months, or for more than a year. So we would like to make that equipment available to them on a permanent basis by offering them the ability to purchase it at a reduced cost," she said.

"Prices have been set at a fair market value, and information about that can be obtained through our office."
